



Froggin' in Forsyth America Recycles Day 2020 – Contest Details

Did you know there are 14 frogs that inhabit Forsyth County? Frogs have been around for at least 250 million years. This means that frogs have lived through 3–THREE–different mass extinctions, including the one that killed all the dinosaurs. They are extraordinary animals that add not only diversity but also beauty to our Earth. We need to protect our environment and think about how our actions can affect the frogs living around us.

For your contest entry, in written (poem or short story) or artwork (drawn or photograph), pick **ONE** of the 14 Frogs of Forsyth, and:

- tell/show us something special or unique about the frog you picked
- show/tell how we can protect frog habitats in our community and be good citizens of our planet.

ALL entries need to include Reaping Nature's mascot Echo the Squirrel™. *Creativity Counts!*

Winners will be selected based on the incorporation of the contest theme in their entry and originality in first, second and third place in two different age categories: 8 and under and 9 to 12. Prize packages will be awarded to first, second and third place winners in each age category. Make sure your entry has your name, school (if applicable) and phone number on it and a completed Entry Form is attached.

Winners will be notified by email or telephone by Thursday, November 19, 2020. Prize packages, where appropriate, will be delivered to winners' school. All contest entries must be received by Sunday, November 15, 2020 (America Recycles Day!).
